Psychology of Conspiracy Mentality

After developing a shared understanding of what a conspiracy theory is and what is supposed to be problematic about it, central findings of psychological research on conspiracy beliefs will be conveyed in a lecture. Conspiracy Theories as a Challenge to Democracy – What can we do?

Since the Corona pandemic, conspiracy theories have been discussed more intensively than ever before. Teamwork Required - The Difficult Handling of Conspiracy Beliefs

Conspiracy beliefs have dramatic consequences on a personal and societal level. Belief in conspiracy ideologies has been shown to have negative effects on personal well-being by increasing feelings of insecurity and fear. In addition, the belief in conspiracy ideologies increases the support for illegitimate forms of protest and violence. The workshop will present and discuss current methods for dealing with conspiracy theories on the levels of primary, secondary and tertiary prevention.

Civil society organisations have been warning for years about the dangers of conspiracy beliefs for our society and their connection to right-wing extremism. The Corona pandemic has brought conspiracy beliefs into the focus of police work on various levels. Civil society is increasingly reaching the limits of its effectiveness due to a radicalisation of the conspiracy ideology scene, and police institutions often lack background knowledge on this phenomenon.
